

From the Glove Box



Here is a solution for the Glove Box. During the tour last month a couple of club members mentioned that the wide white walls on my 54 were yellow and needed to be cleaned. I agreed that they were yellow. I had used Westley's in the past, but did not have a chance to use it to clean them before the tour.



Well at the first Garage Nite at Dick Olson's we talked about this again because I drove my 54 and the white walls were still yellow. And Dick had just purchased some new tires from Coker. Someone at Coker suggested that he use Wide White to clean and maintain his new white walls. Well, Dick had tried it and ended up using Westley's. Bob Helgeson recommended Oil Eater.



Dick said he was surprised that Oil Eater would work on the white walls. He had some in the garage, but never thought to try it on white walls. One way to find out, let's give it a try on my tires. So, most of us went outside and Bob sprayed one of my yellow tires and scrubbed away. We watched as the Oil Eater dissolved the dirt and grime from the tires. Now, with one clean tire, we decided to try the Westley's on a second tire. It worked, but the Oil Eater did a faster and better job. So, I ended up cleaning the other two. Thanks Bob for the suggestion and Dick for the use of your Oil Eater. You can dilute it to clean other items (see below for some samples).

You can purchase Oil Eater at Costco. It comes in a 160 ounce container with an empty 32 oz. spray bottle and costs \$ 7.99.
